Next Sunday's Mass Readings Genesis 22: 1-2, 9-13, 15-18; Psalm 115; Romans 8: 31-34; Mark 9: 2-10

Registered as a Charity, Birmingham Roman Catholic Diocesan Trustees: Registered Charity Number 234216. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus, we are on the First Sunday of Lent. Lent brings to our mind the forty days of fasting and prayer undertaken by Jesus before starting His public ministry. Lent calls to mind humanity's transgressions which caused ineffable pain to the Creator and invites everyone to repent and to believe in the Gospel. Lent is also a special time in the life of every Christian to intensify his or her commitment to live as a true disciple of Christ.

The first reading and the second reading speak about theme of covenantal relationship between God and humanity. We could find some relationship between the two covenants seen in the first and second readings. In the first reading, water was the object of destruction while it became the object of salvation in the second reading through the waters of baptism. While a few were saved in the first, all who desire to be saved will be saved in the second. The Ark was the vehicle of salvation in the second. In the first, a group of created things represented covenantal relationship with Yahweh, while in the second, Jesus Christ is the focal point of the covenant though whom all the human beings are saved. Thus, St Peter affirms that Jesus represents the whole humanity in establishing covenantal relationship with God.

God's faithfulness to the covenant is again revealed during the temptation scene narrated in the gospel of today. By overcoming temptations, Jesus shows himself to be faithful to God and to the covenant. Not giving in to temptations Jesus confirms that he will never betray God and the covenant, come what may! Indeed, the temptations of Jesus represent all the attractions and trials he would have encountered in his life. This experience of Jesus indicates an essential condition of human being, that is, everyone is subjected to temptations, attractions, trials and difficulties. By his victory over the attractions of the devil, Jesus communicates to us of the possibility of being victorious over them.

Firstly Jesus was the kind of person who did not let his body dictate to his spirit. He did not let his feelings influence his actions. There is something attractive about a person like that. We cannot help but admire someone who lives so completely by the Spirit. Secondly, because Jesus experienced temptation himself, he knows how overwhelming temptation can be. He knows how easy it is to be swept away by temptation. For this reason, Jesus can sympathize with our weakness or be compassionate with us when we are tempted. He understands when we give in to temptation. Because he was tempted like us, Jesus is someone we can turn to in time of temptation. Jesus in the desert is our model during Lent. If Jesus had given in to any temptation of the devil, he would have wrecked his Father's plans. When we give in to temptation, we wreck God's plans for us. Sin separates us from what God intends for us. Sin separates us from God. But our love for Jesus impels us to want to overcome sin during Lent so that we will not be separated from Him. Our love for Jesus impels us to take Lent seriously so that at the end of Lent we will be closer to Jesus. It is only when we admit that we are sinners and we need God's mercy something that we can deal with it. The first stage in overcoming anything is to admit the problem. If we remain in denial, we miss out on the grace of God to heal us and renew us and make us whole. During Lent we say no to the devil's temptations to continue committing sin, and instead we trust in our heavenly Father like Jesus in the desert. Lent is not only about helping others, about doing something, it is also very much about the type of person we are.

In fact, the whole life of Jesus is characterized by transforming the problems into opportunities, weakness into strength and disadvantages into advantages. For him, every problem was a hidden opportunity to do something good and positive. This attitude of Jesus invites us to transform our weakness into strength, our poverty into wealth, and our difficulty into opportunities and thus to have fruitful Lent.
