Live streaming from the Sacred Heart Church has been installed. Please make use of this to participate in Mass and other events if you are unable to attend church. Consent forms have been distributed via email and are also available from either Fr. George or the parish office. These will need to be completed prior to the first Mass you help at. The front pew may be visible, if you do not want your image to be part of the live stream then please sit further back in the church. The pandemic has resulted in a significant fall in parish income. FIRST HOLY COMMUNION PROGRAMME 2021

If your child is in Year 3 or above and you wish for your child to be prepared to receive this Sacrament in the summer 2021, please would you contact Fr. George SCJ as soon as possible. The first meeting for parents and children will take place in May, date and time will be announced in due course. Due to the Covid-19 restrictions in place, this year the children being prepared by the parish will receive their First Holy Communion separately from the children at St. Joseph's. REPORT ON THE ONLINE LENT RETREAT 2021

During Lent two groups of people met weekly online for an hour, 13 of us on Tuesday afternoons and 15 on Thursday evenings. We came from different churches, different denominations and different places – including several from Sacred Heart. The Jesuits at ISC in Glasgow sent daily emails with a Scripture reading, a short reflection, a picture and a piece of music all on the day's theme. We all prayed individually for 20 to 30 minutes each day with whatever parts of that day's material that seemed to speak to us. At the weekly online meetings, we shared what we wanted to of our felt experience during or after our prayer, though without further discussion. It was a listening group. Right from the start we were surprised how deep and open was this sharing and we all felt that that Spirit was moving strongly amongst us and there was a strong feeling of community in the groups. Again surprisingly, it seemed that doing this all on Zoom, rather than being physically present, made it easier for people to take part and to share so easily and deeply. We felt it a really blessed retreat.

Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Acts 10: 25-26, 34-35, 44-48; Psalm 97; 1 John 4: 7-10; Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

You are the branches!

You must have heard about the Great Grapevine in Hampton Court near London that is about 250 years old. It has but one root which is at least two feet thick. Some of the branches are 200 feet long. Because of skillful cutting and pruning, the vine produces several tons of grapes each year. Even though some of the smaller branches are 200 feet from the main stem, they bear much fruit because they are joined to the vine and allow the life of the vine to flow through them. The discourse of Jesus on the vine and the branches seems to make this very point. It also gives us a beautiful image of Church and in doing so, states emphatically that Christian existence and life is never merely an individual life, but always a life lived in and through community of faithful.

In today's Gospel, Jesus uses the metaphor of the vine to express the relationship with His father and His disciples. Thus, the focus of the metaphor is interrelationship. If God is the vine dresser, Jesus is the vine and the disciples are the branches. While it is easy for most of us to understand God as the vine dresser and Jesus as the vine, it is important for us to understand our role as branches. If one branch cuts itself off from the vine not only will that branch wither and die and not be able to produce any fruit, but it will also result in the incompleteness of the vine. This means then that all positions in the Church are only functional and not to be used to dominate or oppress. It also means that each of us is responsible for the welfare of the other.

All too often Christianity has been understood as a religion that has only the individual dimension. The communitarian dimension has been neglected. This is seen in so many of the Sacraments (which are both individual and communitarian) being treated and regarded as private devotions. The metaphor of today makes explicit that mutual indwelling is at the heart of the preaching of Jesus, and that Christianity, while it surely has an individual dimension, just as surely it has a communitarian dimension. I am, as a Christian, my brother's and sister's keeper. Their joys and sorrow, their trials and tribulations, their successes and failures, have to be as real to me as my own if I am to be a Christian in the true sense of the word. The Christian does make an individual commitment and choice to follow Jesus, but he/she makes it in and through a community. This is seen clearly in the first reading of today, in which Saul who became Paul made such a choice. While Paul did have a personal experience of the Lord and was called by him though they were initially afraid because of his past, dared to directly, he also had to be accepted by the community who accept him as one of the branches of the vine. They not only did this, but also made his trial and tribulations their own, protecting him when his life was in danger. In doing so, the community showed in practice what it meant to be part of the vine.

If we, the branches, are not bearing much fruit, it may be that we are not feeding as we ought upon the life-giving flow from the vine. The great truth that Jesus is trying to tell us is that if we want life in all its fullness, then we must be connected to the "true vine," the very source of life. "Abide in me as I abide in you," Jesus said. We draw our life from him.
