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COVID 19 STEP 4 GUIDANCE

- Sanitise your hands at the entrance and exit.
- Masks: We highly recommend you to wear a mask in the church.
- **Test and Trace**: Please give your name and contact details to the stewards for Test and Trace or make use of the QR code provided at the entrance.
- **Seating**: There will not be any cordoned pews, so you can occupy any pew you wish to sit. In a pew a maximum of four people can sit, except family pews. Please leave the family pews for the families with children.
- Holy Communion: Holy Communion will continue to be under one kind.
- Congregational Singing: Indoor congregational singing is permitted. It is recommended that singing should be phased in gently as part of worship and that face coverings should be worn by members of the congregation whilst singing together, until infection levels reduce.
- Exit: To exit please use both the main door and the side door.
- Capacity of the Church: Increased to 150
- Church visiting by the public: The church will be open to the public for private prayer and for visiting from 8.00 am until 1.00 pm.

Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Wisdom 2: 12, 17-20; Psalm 53;

James 3: 16 - 4: 3

Mark 9: 30-37

Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

Who is Christ for Me?

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ Jesus, On the 24th Sunday of the year, the evangelist Mark makes us reflect about the identity of Jesus through a question raised by Jesus himself. Jesus asks his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" The disciples replied with different answers. Jesus asked them another question "Who do you say that I am?" Peter answers him: "You are the Christ". By the fact that Jesus did not ask any more question about his identity reveals that he was happy with the answer given by Peter. It is good for us to reflect why Jesus was satisfied with the answer of Peter.

Our limited understanding makes us affirm that Jesus is a prophet like John the Baptist and Elijah. But Jesus is someone greater than the prophets; he is the Christ, the anointed one, the Son of God. The answer of Peter that Jesus is the Christ, makes Jesus an indispensable part of our life because we who are creatures do not have existence without Jesus who is the Son of God. The question that Jesus asked the disciples, he pauses before us today. Who do we say that Jesus is? We can give different answers, and perhaps all of them right. But the perfect answer would be the answer given by Peter. It is important to have the right answer because it expresses our belief system. And our beliefs will always determine our lifestyle. Our faith will always express itself in corresponding action. If our answer is wrong or partial, our lifestyle too can be faulty or one-sided.

This is the truth that the second reading of today, taken from the letter of St James, confirms. St. James states that our faith cannot be devoid of good works. If our faith is not accompanied by works, it is dead. The focal point of how faith leads to consequent life style is very clear in the conversation that follows between Jesus and Peter. Peter was happy that he could give the right answer to Jesus about his identity. Though he gave the right answer, he had a wrong idea about Christ. He, perhaps, thought of a triumphant and glorious Christ who would destroy the enemies and establish the Kingdom of God. On the contrary, Jesus expressed the true identity of the Christ as someone who has to suffer; he would be rejected by the elders, the chief priests and the scribes, and be killed. Peter could never accept a suffering Christ. He could never accept a weak Christ who would be put to death by the enemies. It is true even in this age. The modern society has difficulty to accept a God who suffered for humanity. Hence, Peter began to rebuke Jesus and correct him. The response of Jesus to Peter's rebuke is very harsh. He tells Peter: "Get behind me satan". Jesus has never used the word satan against anyone else. Jesus had enemies. There were people trying to plot against him and to get rid of him. Jesus, as son of man, knew their plans. But he never addressed them as satan. On the contrary, here is Jesus calling his dearest disciple satan. What is the reason? The reason, I believe, is simple: how you believe, so you live. If Peter were to believe in a glorious king in Jesus, he would also expect to be glorious in his way of life. On the contrary the way of life shown by Jesus is different: a simple life, a life of sacrifice, a life of suffering, a life of unconditional love. This doesn't mean that our God doesn't wish our wellbeing. He wants us to value both happiness and sorrow as part of human life and we need to discover God's plan in all those times. We need to find God's hands in all the events of our day today life. Let us get our thoughts enlightened and inspired because where our thoughts are there we are; if we save our thoughts, we save ourselves. May you all have a lovely Sunday.
