Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Exodus 3: 1-8, 13-15; Psalm 102; 1 Corinthians 10: 1-6, 10-12; Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

The mysterious episode of the transfiguration told in today's Gospel (Luke 9:28-36) confirms the pattern of life and mission set by Jesus in his triple victory over Satan during the time of his testing in the desert, the account of which we heard last Sunday. The focal point of the event of transfiguration is a mountain. The Gospel describing the transfiguration clearly has three parts: (1) going up the mountain, (2) the moment of grace on top of the mountain and (3) coming down the mountain with the fruits of that experience.

Going up the mountain: The gospel reading of Ash Wednesday, proposed a programme for the spiritual journey of the season of Lent: fasting, prayer and almsgiving. These three 'strategies' are relevant not only for the season of Lent but throughout our Christian life. The season of Lent is but an intense way of living out our Christian life. Therefore fasting, prayer and almsgiving are ways to go beyond ourselves, extend our hearts to God (vertical dimension – in prayer) and to stretch out our hands to our neighbours (the horizontal dimension – in charity). These two dimensions of our Christian life journey are like going up the mountain and coming down it. What does the gospel text of today tell us about going up the mountain, more precisely, about Christian prayer? It is Jesus who "took with him Peter and James and his brother John went up a high mountain where they be alone." It is God himself who enables us to pray. Just as it was God who invited Abram to enter a covenant with Him, as we heard in the first reading of today (Gen. 12: 1-4), it is God who invites us to enter a relationship with Him in prayer. Our task is to respond positively to His invitation. Lent is the special time set aside for this.

On the mountain-top: On top of the mountain the three disciples are privileged to witness a theophany despite their own inability to be present to God. Other Gospels tell us, "Peter and his companions were heavy with sleep..." (Lk 9: 32). They see Jesus in the company of two great men in the history of Israel: Moses and Elijah. Moses stands for the Law and Elijah for the Prophets, thus showing that Jesus is the fulfilment of the Old Testament. And "suddenly from the cloud there came a voice which said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; he enjoys my favour. Listen to him!'" (v.5) This was for the disciples an experience of God in the person of Jesus. We encounter God in the person of Jesus. That is the very reason why He took human form. We see God and feel His presence in the person of Jesus. The most experiential moment is the time that we receive Him in the Eucharist.

Coming down the mountain: The Gospels tell us: "As they came down from the mountain Jesus gave them this order, 'Tell no one about this vision until the Son of man has risen from the dead'" (Mt 17: 9). God experience invites us to silence and contemplation, so that the effects of the experience could be deepened, at least until the right time. Secondly, this silence is not necessarily a permanent isolation from the world. It is also something that is carried forward to the marketplace, to our daily life, to our homes, to the place of work and study. This is the significance of coming down the mountain. The spiritual exercises of the Lenten season are meant to offer us the possibility of experiencing God more deeply, and to carry that experience to our encounter with people. May Christ who transfigured on Mount Tabor bless us to live in a state of grace all through this lent.
