Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Acts 10: 34, 37-43; Psalm 117; 1 Corinthians 5: 6-8 John 20: 1-9 Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

"He saved us through his suffering"

Today is Passion Sunday. Generally, we associate the word passion with strong emotions of fear, love, hatred and anger. Passion is also unlimited zeal and enthusiasm and this enthusiasm can be negative or positive. In the expression of emotions, we hear stories of passionate lovers such as Romeo and Juliet of Shakespeare and in the expression of enthusiasm we recall stories of passionate leaders like Nelson Mandela. We also read stories of leaders who had destructive passions such as Adolf Hitler, Idi Amin, etc. Scriptures warn against negative passions such as anger, lust and hatred and encourages crucifying passions of the flesh (Galatians 5: 24). Today's liturgy combines both a sense of "triumph" and "tragedy". At the beginning, we commemorate the triumph of Christ our King. This is done through the blessing of palms, the procession and the singing. In the Liturgy of the word, we hear the story of the sufferings and indignities to which Jesus was subjected. However, we keep in mind that even in this "tragedy" there is "triumph", because Christ came for precisely this purpose, to save in and through His death.

So, if passion is about emotion and enthusiasm, then what has passion got to do with the suffering and death of Jesus? The entire life of Jesus was full of passion. He carried out his mission with passion and zeal for his work consumed him (John 2:17). Nevertheless, the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus is specifically called Passion because no part of the life of Jesus evokes so much emotion, passion and compassion. The Sorrowful mysteries of the Holy Rosary provide a good summary of the Passion narrative. These five mysteries: the agony in the garden; the scourging at the pillar; crowning with thorns; carrying of the cross and crucifixion were all moments of intense struggle and emotion. Mel Gibson's film, The Passion of the Christ, in 2004 attracted millions of viewers because of the graphic presentation of the Passion of Christ. The movie demonstrates the intensity of the suffering and anguish of Jesus. The Passion of Jesus is also an eloquent story of betrayal by a trusted friend and confidant. His Passion tells us that suffering is not reserved for guilty but that the innocent also suffers. John Piper, author of the book, "The Passion of Jesus Christ says: "Christ did not die to make good works merely possible or to produce a half-hearted pursuit. He died to produce in us a passion for good deeds". Therefore, the ultimate lesson of the Passion story is positive: the tree of death (the cross) is transformed into the tree of life.

The Passion narration we heard in the gospel brings us vivid emotions in us because in it we find God coming to us in his triumphant glory and in utter vulnerability. The Father seems absent and silent in both situations. He does not act, does not use his might and power to stop sinful people from doing their worst to Jesus his Son. It looks as if the Father has abandoned his own beloved Son. Why doesn't he do something? Where is God when the righteous Son is gasping for air on a Roman cross? God remains silent when evil and sin shout, scream and destroy. When the life of the Son of God is snuffed out, it is then that God speaks. He speaks loud and clear. He speaks not in vengeance, counter-attack and destruction. God does not revenge Pilate, the Roman soldiers, the high priests and the passers-by. Instead, he splits a curtain and makes himself open and available! Jesus "emptied himself" totally and became filled with the Spirit of his Father. He clung to nothing; he let go of everything. Do we have the courage to do likewise? God bless us.
