Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Habakkuk 1: 2-3, 2: 2-4; Psalm 94; 2 Timothy 1: 6-8, 13-14; Luke 17: 5-10

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ, last year on the World Day of the Poor, Our Holy Father Pope Francis said: "Christians cannot stand with arms folded in indifference or thrown up in the air in helpless resignation. As believers, we must stretch out our hands as Jesus does with us, freely and lovingly offering help to the poor and all those in need." He urged everyone to pray for the grace to hear the cries of all the poor.

Today's gospel has a lesson for all of us in this regard. The Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus. Many people may be wondering why the rich man had to go to hell. We are not told he acquired his wealth by foul means. We are not told he was responsible for the poverty and misery of Lazarus. In fact we are not even told that Lazarus begged him and he refused to help. We are not told he committed any crime or evil deed. All we are told is that he was feeding and clothing himself well as any other successful human being has a right to do. Why then did he go to hell? The problem why the rich man went to hell has a lot to do with what we think sin is. We often think that we sin only by thought, word and deed. We forget a fourth and very important way through which we sin, namely, by omission. In the "I Confess" we say these words: "I have sinned through my own fault, in my thoughts and in my words, in what I have done and in what I have failed to do." Yet how readily we forget the sin of omission. Today's parable reminds us that the sin of omission can take us away from God. This is what happens to the rich man. The poor man Lazarus was lying at his gate. And the rich man simply didn't care and the poor man died. The rich man of course did not harm Lazarus but he did nothing when he actually could. He failed to reach out and share a little of his blessings with someone in need. His sin is that of omission, and for that he is condemned.

Another problem we have with this parable is why Lazarus went to heaven. Was he a man of God? Or did he do a good deed? In biblical stories of this nature, names are very significant because they often convey the person's basic character or personality. In fact this is the only parable of Jesus where the character in the story has a name. So the name must be significant for interpreting the parable. The name "Lazarus" is the Hellenised form of the Hebrew name "Eleazar" which means "God is my help." Lazarus, therefore, is not just a poor man, but a poor man who believes and trusts in God. This must be why he found himself in Abraham's bosom in Paradise because of his faith and trust in God, not just because he was poor. Rich people who use their wealth to serve God in their fellow human beings will be rewarded in the next life. Poor people who spend their lives in bitterness and envy, refusing to believe and trust in God may yet be condemned in the next life.

In the first reading too from the Prophet Amos we read that those who have a very comfortable life and ignore the needs of others will eventually have to live with the results of that uncaring attitude. We can hear the Lord calling us today to respond in the same way described in the second reading, from the First Letter to Timothy: pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness. We live in a world which has shrunk. The poor are right at our doorstep. We cannot help them all, but we can help some. As Pope Francis reminds us, pray for the grace to hear the cries of all the poor. The Scriptures don't give us an easy answer because there never is an easy answer to the cry of the poor and the oppressed. Each of us must take the time to listen to that cry first and then try to respond to it. We must always remember St Theresa of Calcutta who felt a call to help those who were poor. I end with her quote: "I see Jesus in every human being. I say to myself, this is hungry Jesus, I must feed him. This is sick Jesus. This one has leprosy; I must wash him and tend to him. I serve because I love Jesus." God bless you. Fr. George Mathew SCJ
