LIVE SIMPLY CHRISTMAS

Have you started your Christmas shopping yet? THEN STOP AND THINK. We all need to save money and energy, as well as living simply. Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Isaiah 2: 1-5; Psalm 121;

Romans 13: 11-14;

Matthew 24: 37-44

Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

The Feast of Christ the king was instituted by Pope Pius the XI in 1925. This is the period between two world wars. The world was witnessing the rise of dictators and autocrats, because of whose greed, treachery, pride and self-will, thousands were left wounded, homeless, hungry and poor. It is in this socio-economic and political scenario, Pope decided to propose to the world a model leader - Jesus Christ the King of the Universe.

What is special about Jesus that He should be called as the King of the Universe? While all the other kings born in palaces, He was born in a manger. While all the other kings grow up in the comfort and security, He had had to flee to Egypt for his safety. While all the other kings had servants to carry out orders, He was a servant of all washing the feet of his disciples. While all the other kings felt fear in the company of others, He was feeling at home with the poor, ejected and the marginalised. While all the other kings used their sword and weapons to extend their territory, this King used Love as a weapon to win the hearts of the humanity. He conquered the whole world not through wars and violence but by offering Himself as a ransom for many. Mark Link, the author, would describe the Kingship of Jesus in two ways. Firstly, Jesus is King because who He is. Secondly, because what He did. Jesus was king because of who he was. For example, when Magnus Carlsen defeated the reigning world champion Viswanathan Anand in 2013 the people called Carlsen the chess king. Similarly, we call the lion the king of the jungle because of its power and strength and the mango is called the king of all fruits because of it nutrients. So, anybody or anything that is extraordinarily special we call King. Jesus can be called King because he was the best human being that ever lived here on earth. Centuries have passed and there has been no other person as popular, as admirable and as taught about, studied about and written about as Jesus Christ. Therefore, in every sense He can be called as the King of all kings. The second reason why Jesus can be called as king, is because of what He did. In April 1865, when the slain body of Abraham Lincoln the 16th president of Americas was laying on a stage, a long line of people came to pay their respects. There was also a poor mother and her young child in the queue. When they reached the body, the mother lifted her son and said to him, "Son, take a long, long look, because this man died for you". Yes dear friends, what that poor mother said to her son should resound by all the mothers looking at the Cross of Christ saying, "This Man gave up His life for you and for me, to rise us up from the slavery of sin and death". In the book of prophet Isaiah we read, "He was wounded for our transgressions, He was bruised for our iniquities and by His wound we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5).

So dear friend, what is our takeaway from this feast of Christ the King? First of all, let us try to know Christ, the Eternal King of humanity whose Kingdom is based on righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit that which lasts for ever. When in our daily life we have to face with selfish and greedy rulers and governments, anarchy and lawlessness and wars in the world, we should not be discouraged because no human kings and kingdoms have lasted for eternity, they all have been forgotten behind the wheel of time. If we take a walk in the city of Rome we can see the Colosseum, Chico Massimo, the Roman Forum and Largo Argentina. They all tell the story of great kings and empires, but what remain today are just ruins. The French leader Napoleon Bonaparte, after being defeated in the Battle of Waterloo in 1815, and banished into the island of St. Helena, seems to have said in his lone in less before his death, "No kingdoms of this earth has lasted, except that of the Nazarene". When we think about what Jesus had done for us we need to be loyal to Him and to His Kingdom and be part of His Kingdom. Fr. George Mathew SCJ
