THE DIOCESAN VISION: UNFOLDING GOD'S PLAN FOR THE PARISH

The Diocesan Vision, published at Pentecost 2021, laid out the Archbishop's vision and dream for the future of our Diocese. In continuation of this a series of six sessions has been designed to help parishioners, parish leaders and small groups engage with the Vision, and think about how we can take practical steps to renew the mission and ministries within the parish. We plan to begin these sessions during Lent and continue during the Easter season. We Invite the parishioners and parish groups to come along in a friendly manner to reflect and discuss about our parish life in line with the Diocesan Vision. The first session will begin on **Wednesday 15th March** at 7.00 pm in the Parish Hall. The remaining 5 sessions will follow every Wednesday. Each session will start with an opening prayer, excerpt from the Diocesan Vision document, short reflection, questions/activities and conclusion. The sessions will be 90 minutes each.

Next Sunday's Mass Readings

1 Samuel 16: 1, 3-7, 10-13; Psalm 22; Ephesians 5: 8-14;

John 9: 1-41

Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

Today's Word of God pictures Jesus as the Messiah of all humanity. Throughout the Gospel of John, this theme appears in a variety of ways. One such story is that the encounter of Jesus with the Samaritan woman at the well. First, this story shows that Salvation is possible for everyone, it is not retained for certain people, but is for all humanity. In the story we can see that although Jesus was tired and thirsty, He was more focused on sharing His living water with the woman at the well. Even though the Pharisees and the rest of the Jewish society branded her a public sinner and a person to be avoided. In the multi-season series about the life of Jesus called 'The Chosen', the American film director Dallas Jenkins portraits the Samaritan woman at the well as a victim of sin of circumstances. When everybody hated her because who she was, Jesus knew her innermost longing to encounter God. The director Dallas Jenkins beautifully brought out this inner longing of the woman at the well in series.

The point of this remarkable story in the Gospel is that absolutely nothing stands in the way of our salvation, except not knowing our need of it. That same assurance is given to all of us, that whatever our past maybe we are saved by our encounter with Jesus from whatever weighs us down or holds us back. This is a wonderfully encouraging story of hope and a reminder that the Gospel of Christ isn't primarily a moral code, but rather it is a story of God's unconditional love for His children. The story also reminds us, and this is especially important to remember during Lent, that the Christian gospel isn't primarily about discipline and detachment. Detachment doesn't mean not owning anything, but not being owned by anything. And discipline isn't mere self-restraint, imposed from without, but the ordering of our lives in the direction of God that we desire above everything else. Therefore, to reduce Christianity to good behaviour is to miss the point: it is much more than good behaviour. What Christian life means, primarily, is living and being "in Christ": and that's not a matter of effort, merit or achievement, but sheer gift. Christian life means living with the life Jesus shares with us, his life: seeing, speaking, loving, as he did. St Paul expresses it perfectly. "I live", he says, "now not I, but Christ lives in me". "For me, to live is Christ", says St. Paul. That's where we find ultimate meaning, where everything in our lives comes together.

Once she recognises Jesus as the Messiah, the Samaritan woman ran to tell everyone that she encountered the Messiah. Our testimony about Jesus is a powerful tool in leading others to believe in Him: "Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me everything I ever did.' They themselves came to see Him and listened to Him and more became believers. They said to the woman, 'We no longer believe just because of what you said; now we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this man really is the Saviour of the world" (John 4:39-42). Therefore, three things we need to remember from this gospel. 1) Salvation comes only to those who recognize their desperate need for the spiritual life they do not have. Living water can be obtained only by those who recognize that they are spiritually thirsty. 2) Salvation comes only to those who confess and repent of their sin and desire forgiveness. Before the woman could embrace the Saviour, she had to concede the full burden of her sins. 3) Salvation comes only to those who take hold of Jesus as their Messiah. For the absolute truth is that salvation is found in no one else (John 14:6; Acts 4:12). Fr. George Mathew SCJ
