## The Rector's Reflection

#### **Sharing the Church's Story**









# Today March 16th is the 39th anniversary of the death of Monsignor Bruno Scott James - first priest custodian of the Slipper Chapel

(Born 1906 and died March 16th 1984.)





When Mgr. Bruno Scott James died in 1984, his great friend, Bishop Gordon Wheeler of Leeds, spoke of him in the fondest of tributes: "Enveloped in a black cloak, his head shorn, and with a Siamese cat perched on his shoulder, sitting on the steps of the Slipper Chapel and pouring out patristic wisdom was an inspiration to many. He had a great gift of prayer himself and was able to communicate this to others."

Rest in peace dear Mgr. Bruno Scott James and may your dream of Walsingham becoming a power-house of prayer become an even greater

Fr. Bruno Scott James (a convert) was appointed as the first resident parish priest of Walsingham and Custodian of the Slipper Chapel in 1935. He was appointed by Bishop Youens of Northampton with a mandate to establish a Shrine at the Slipper Chapel. Walsingham was designated as an episcopal parish. At the time the Shrine had no pilgrims and the only two parishioners in Walsingham were Mr. Arthur Bond and Mr Claude Fisher, both converts.

Fr. Bruno took up this appointment immediately following his ordination in Rome. The Abbot of Downside at the time described him as an '*independent-minded, freelance priest'*. This served him well for the difficult task in Walsingham to which God had called him!

It was actually in the Slipper Chapel that the young Bruno Scott James had received the call to become a catholic. He said ... "One day, driven to the verge of desperation by the awful choice that seemed to lie ahead of me, I walked out to the Slipper Chapel and, having obtained the key from the custodian, threw myself on my knees and implored God to give me the grace to follow his will whatever the cost might be and wherever it might lead me. I then vowed, hardly realising what I said, that if Our Lady would obtain from her Son this grace for me I would devote my life to her service at Walsingham."

Fr. Bruno was in Walsingham only a short time from 1935 to 1943 of around 7 years. This were years of great growth and flourishing. The wasteland of Walsingham which Fr. Bruno found himself in, was heightened by the lack of pilgrims. The great Pilgrimage of Return of 1934 led by Francis Cardinal Bourne seemed to have been a one off! The slow road to the re-establishment of regular pilgrimage was left in the hands of Claude Fisher who was appointed as the first Pilgrimage Secretary. Fr. Bruno meanwhile worked on a wider pastoral and apostolic work of preaching. He began by preaching each day from the steps of the Slipper Chapel to whoever might be passing by! Preached Retreats followed and soon the roads around were full to overflowing. Fr. Bruno prepared shepherd's huts, so that those who wanted to come on Retreat might have somewhere basic to stay over.

## It was Fr. Bruno's dream that Walsingham should become a place of pilgrimage but most of all a power-house of prayer.

Fr. Bruno Scott James left Walsingham in 1943 due to ill health, and spent three months at Downside Abbey, before being appointed to Rome by Pope Paul IV to the Basilica of Santa Maria in Trastevere with the title Monsignor, and then to Naples where he founded a hall of residents for students at the

University of Naples - John Henry Newman College. Fr. Bruno was a prolific writer on St. Bernard of Clairvaux, and wrote many books on the spiritual life.

Failing health in his later years compelled Mgr. Bruno to return to England. He died on March 16th 1984, aged 77 years, among friends in Brighton. He is buried at his beloved Downside Abbey.

# Seventy-Five years since the Cross Carrying Pilgrimage

This year 2023, is the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the 1948 "Cross Carrying Pilgrimage of Prayer and Penance for Peace", when the 14 Wooden Crosses that form the Stations of the Cross in the Slipper Chapel grounds were brought to Walsingham from various towns throughout England and Wales.

400 men took part and were allotted to various towns or cities around the country that had been chosen as starting points for the pilgrimage. All the groups gathered at their starting point on the evening of the 2nd of July and arrived in Walsingham on the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel the 16th of July. Fourteen days walking, allowing the meditation of each station to be undertaken during a whole day's walk.

Each group was made up of men only, it was 1948 after all, many of whom were ex-servicemen, teachers, seminarians, priests and religious, builders and

unemployed. Some young women did however unofficially take part!

At a recent dinner at the Anglican Shrine celebrating the founding of the "Walsingham Camino", I was approached by a gentleman (M. Munt) who had purchased an item from eBay that he thought should belong to the Basilica and National Shrine Archive.

It was a collection of 10 postcards and one lettercard that had been sent by Christopher Moore, a walker with the Westminster Cross Carrying Group, one, each evening, to his family in Hendon, London NW4.

This generous gift is a tremendous record of the joys and hardships encountered by the pilgrims as they walked the rather strange route planned for the Westminster Cross. To stretch the walk over the 14 Days, having left East London, the walkers followed a mainly coastal path, with evening stops at: Ilford, Brentwood, Chelmsford, Kelvedon, Stoke-by-Nayland, Ipswich, Parham, Southwold, Lowestoft, Great Yarmouth, North Walsham and Cromer, having come from the South eventually entering the Holy Land of Walsingham from the North.

Some of Christopher's observations are worthy of inclusion here.

From Card 1: I shall try to let you have a line from each night's stopping place. It is almost more like an outing than a pilgrimage, we have been treated so well...

From Card 2: A terrific day today, rain all day and wet through on arrival"... blisters are doing nicely.

From Card 3: ...An easy day today, only 12 miles and schoolgirls (Ursuline) from Brentwood came all the way keen to carry the cross and then to take our packs...if I could cut off my two little toes it would be more comfortable.

From Card 4: Shoulders a bit sore and feet somewhat painful at times but many are worse than I am...

From Card 5: A terrific day today, the heaviest so far as feet are proving a problem... do not worry, Our Lady of Walsingham has us all well in hand.

From Card 6: We received such a welcome here that your evening card went unwritten...

From Card 7: Rain again on and off all day...Some of the most enthusiastic girls from Romford have come all the way...three of them played truant from school...Our toast at the pub 'the skin of your feet!

From Card 8: Another 20 miles gone in a very bleak and sparsely populated country... Our thanks for the chocolate.

From Card 9: ...Feet better but 28 miles tomorrow may mean another story, muscles beginning to complain mildly...

From card 10: The 28 miles nearly did me, but after a visit to a doctor my toes have a new lease of life...I am determined to finish.

From Card 11: ...no more till Walsingham, God bless and love to all, Christopher.

Christopher's parents seem to have come to Walsingham for the end of the pilgrimage. In the Shrine archive we have a short memoir from one of the 'girls' from Romford. We intend to exhibit the postcards and the memoir in the Anniversary Exhibition.
