REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 12TH NOVEMBER

White poppies were first worn in the aftermath of the First World War, to hold on to the key message of Remembrance Day, "Never Again". They stand for three things: 1.Remembrance of all victims of war, including people killed in wars happening now, as well as those who are often excluded such as civilians and refugees. 2.Challenging militarism, as well as any attempt to glorify or celebrate war. 3.A commitment to peace and to seeking nonviolent solutions to conflict today. We invite you all to come wearing a white poppy on Remembrance Sunday. The White Poppies are available to buy from the back of the church for £1.

CHRISTMAS FAIR

Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Wisdom 6:12-16;
Psalm 62;
1 Thessalonians
4;13-18;
Matthew 25:1-13

Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

The background of today's first reading from post-exilic prophet Malachi. Malachi preaches after the second Temple was built in 515 BC by those who returned from exile. When they first returned to Judea from their captivity in Babylon, the Jews rigorously guarded against pagan idol worship in their land. But over time, they gradually gave in to the sin idolatry. In the process, they also began to lose sight of God's purposes for them. It was during this period that Malachi was sent to instruct and guide God's people toward a purer life.

During our noviciate, a period of intense training before committing one's life to religious life, our spiritual father advised us to ask 4 questions to ourselves every night before we went to bead: - Was I loving in my relationships today? - did I involved in the joys and sorrows of others? - Was I forgiving and merciful? - Did I reflect enthusiasm in everything I did? The questions appear very simple, but very challenging in reflection. But they are based on the Gospels and therein lies the motivation. It would appear that Our Lord in today's Gospel is not happy with the leaders of his time- they were pompous and arrogant, they placed burdens on the people and they failed to practice what they preached. The key to Christian leadership lies in "bent knees, wet eyes, a lifted finger and a loving heart." Because leadership is not so much a privilege or an honour, it is in fact a responsibility. Now, the good part about Christian leadership is that we do not need any formal appointment to be known as leaders. When we browse through the Bible, we realize that God calls any person to leadership to address a situation or a need. So, if this call were to be translated into today's circumstances, then let's understand that in our family, for example, one can be an effective leader as a parent and even as a child. In school, college or even one's place of work, effective leadership can be exercised. Even in your community where you live you can be an effective leader. Christian leadership emerges from Christ, the leader who on bent knees, with wet eyes, a lifted finger and a loving heart brought the Good News to people. When we bend our knees in prayer and worship, we are acknowledging the power that comes from God who journeys with us. When our eyes are wet with tears seeing the pain and struggles of the people around us, we reflect the compassion of Jesus. When we lift our finger to help those struggling with life, we are reliving the words of Our Lord at the Last Supper - "Do this in memory of me." When we exercise our ministry with a loving heart, we are fulfilling the commandment of Jesus to love God, love others and ourselves.

Our entire second reading today is a simple description of what servant leadership is all about in the words of St Paul. He minces no words in making the Thessalonians aware of the nourishment given, the compassion shown, and the hard work involved in proclaiming the Good News. The world needs more Christian leaders in our families, in the society in the church, whether old or young, rich or poor, qualified or unqualified, who on bent knees, with wet eyes, a lifted finger and a loving heart can make a big difference in the name of Jesus. Are you ready to accept the challenge?
