Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Acts 5:27b-32,40b-41;

Psalm 30(29);

Apocalypse 5:11-14;

John 21:1-19

Dear Sisters and Brothers. Today we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday. Once again we hear the resonance of this wonderful illuminating story of the Risen Lord. The evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked where the disciples were, Jesus came and stood in their midst. This is an icon of the church, so here are the disciples still afraid, still wondering, still unsure, and Jesus comes now despite the locked doors, and he stands in their midst. Despite their fear Jesus comes and stands in their midst. This is the same risen Christ who comes and stands in the midst of the church from age to age, even to this day. 'Wherever two or three are gathered in my name there I am, in their midst.' So, every time we gather for the Mass, the same risen Christ, despite the locked doors of our own fears and apprehensions, comes and stands in our midst. He shows them his hands and his side - the wounds, lest they forget what the world did to Him. The wounds of Jesus are the sign that all is not right with us. He shows us His hands and then He wishes us Shalom- שלום 'peace be with you'. He came back to those who had denied, betrayed and run from Him and for those still denying, betraying and running away from Him. For those who had contributed to His death He comes back with a word of Shalom. Shalom, peace: that's the offer of divine mercy.

In the year 2000 the then Holy Father St. John Paul II instituted the Feast of the Divine Mercy to be celebrated for the first time in the year 2001 on the second Sunday of Easter. It arises out of a series of apparitions that Jesus gave to the Polish nun Sr. Faustyna Kowalska. In its depth Jesus promised her that those who go to confession and receive Holy Communion on this day not only receive forgiveness for their sins but a total remission of the temporal punishments for their sins. This promise which is recorded in the diary of St. Faustyna three times, speaks to the significance of celebrating this feast in a worthier manner. In one of His promises Jesus says "My daughter, tell the whole world of my inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge for all souls, especially for poor sinners. On that day, the depths of my tender mercy are open; I pour out the whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of my mercy. Let no soul fear to draw near to me, even though its sins are as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or angel, will be able to fathom it throughout eternity. Everything that exist comes from the very depth of my most tender mercy". Beautiful words come from our Lord. The revelation that St. Faustyna received, telling her about Divine Mercy, is telling us the importance of celebrating this day invoking the mercy of Jesus. Today's readings show that divine mercy is not just a nice theoretical concept or devotion. It is experienced in the concrete circumstances of our lives. The disciples come to know it in their confusion and sense of having betrayed Jesus. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is based on the human experience that we need both to name our faults and hear the mercy of God proclaimed on the specific circumstances of our lives.

I love this story about Teresa of Avila. One day, while she was praying, the devil appeared to her in the guise of the Risen Christ. But she saw through it and she said, 'begone, Satan'. But, before he left, he said, 'How did you know that I wasn't the real Christ?' and she said, 'You have no wounds'. Yes, if Christ appears to you without his wounds, that's not the true Christ. It is the outpouring of the mercy of God upon us. It signals the greatest love story the world has ever known. "By His wounds you have been healed." These words must echo in our minds and hearts during the Easter Season. They remind us of the reality of the healing that Jesus accomplishes for us each day. Five Wounds: hands, feet, side, and sometimes wounds on His head and shoulders represent his suffering and sacrifice for humanity, offering a visual reminder of God's love and the healing power of Christ's Passion. These wounds are not just physical but also symbolic of the wounds of Original Sin, and they point to the restoration and redemption offered through Christ's death and resurrection. Let us always taste His Unconditional Love and Mercy in the Holy Eucharist.
