#### **THE JUBILEE LOGO 2025**

The logo shows four stylized figures, representing all of humanity, coming from the four corners of the earth. They embrace each other to indicate the solidarity and fraternity which should unite all peoples. The figure at the front is holding onto the cross. It is not only the sign of the faith which this

lead figure embraces, but also of hope, which can never be abandoned, because we are always in need of hope, especially in our moments of greatest need. There are the rough waves under the figures, symbolising the fact that life's pilgrimage does not always go smoothly in calm waters. Often the circumstances of daily life and events in the wider world require a greater call to hope. That's why we should pay special attention to the lower part of the cross which has been elongated and turned into the shape of an anchor which is let down into the waves. The anchor is well known as a symbol of hope. In maritime jargon the 'anchor of hope' refers to the reserve anchor used by vessels involved in emergency manoeuvres to stabilise the ship during storms. It is worth noting that the image illustrates the pilgrim's journey not as an individual undertaking, but rather as something communal, marked by an increasing dynamism leading one ever closer to the cross. The cross in the logo is by no means static, but it is also dynamic. It bends down towards humanity, not leaving human beings alone, but stretching out to them to offer the certainty of its presence and the security of hope. At the bottom of the logo is the motto of the 2025 Jubilee Year: Peregrinantes in Spem (Pilgrims in hope), represented in green letters.

#### **DAY FOR LIFE 2025**

"Every year, the Church in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland, jointly marks the Day for Life, as a reminder of the need to respect and protect the inherent value and dignity of each life. ## Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Proverbs 8:22-31

Psalm 8;

Romans 5:1-5;

John 16:12-15

All of us go for our holidays to various places. Some curious explorers go to places they never visited before and countries with different cultures and languages. Have you ever experienced confusion and helplessness when travelling to those countries or places where no one speaks your language? And suddenly from nowhere you hear a voice that speaks your language. Doesn't that bring a sense of comfort and connection? The first reading, taken from the Acts of the Apostles, recounts a similar transformative moment in early Christianity. The Holy Spirit descended upon the gathered disciples during the Jewish festival of Shavuot, known to Christians as Pentecost. This event, occurring fifty days after Passover, was traditionally a time to celebrate the giving of the Torah at Sinai. Luke's narrative reinterprets this festival as the inauguration of a new covenant, marked by the outpouring of the Spirit and the birth of the church's mission to the world. The passage describes a sudden, dramatic event: a sound like a violent wind fills the house, tongues of fire rest upon each disciple, and they begin to speak in various languages. This phenomenon draws a diverse crowd of Jews from across the Mediterranean, each hearing the message in their native tongue. This multilingual proclamation signifies the universal reach of the Gospel and the inclusive nature of the emerging Christian community.

Before his Ascension Jesus had enjoined the apostles to remain in Jerusalem until the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, comes. The apostles and the other followers of Jesus very wisely huddled around Mary and "devoted themselves with one accord to prayer". They prayed together with Mary to learn from her how to get ready to receive the Holy Spirit, for it was she who was overshadowed by the Holy Spirit at Jesus's virginal conception and who continually lived as a Spouse of the Holy Spirit, receiving and responding to his inspirations in an exemplary way. United with her they prayed, and they waited until they all were filled with the Holy Spirit. It is crucial for us to ponder the role of the Holy Spirit in our Christian life. What does Pentecost mean to us today? For us to receive the Holy Spirit we must long for Him, long for Him like Mary and the apostles, and then we must allow Him to transform us. How does the Holy Spirit want to transform us as we receive Him? We can focus on four ways.

The first way is through our prayer. The Holy Spirit helps us to learn how to pray. To receive the Holy Spirit well means that we're ready to cooperate in our prayer and allow Him to change the way we pray and then we become what we pray. Secondly, He wants to transform us as we receive Him. The Holy Spirit is sent to guide us. To receive the Holy Spirit means that we want Him to help us to put to death in us whatever lives by the flesh so that we may totally live by His inspiration, His in-breathing, as Mary and the apostles did, and as the saints have ever since. Thirdly, He wants to transform us into missioners and make us boldly and confidently share the faith with others. By baptism and confirmation we've all received the same Holy Spirit that the apostles received on Pentecost. So, we need to use every means we have and announce Christ's kingdom in and around where we live and move. Lastly, the Holy Spirit wants to transform us by making us aware of His gifts so that we might use them to transform ourselves and others. He has given each of us "spiritual gifts" so that we may carry out the "different forms of service" necessary to make Christ's Body, the Church, strong. He wants to help us to recognize what our gifts are and, just as importantly, to use them to build up our family, parishes and the Church as a whole and help it fulfil its mission in the world. The mission of the Church is not just for ordained or consecrated "specialists". To receive the Holy Spirit is to recognize that we are called to be contributors rather than consumers, givers rather than takers, co-responsible participants rather than seated spectators in the mission Christ has given to the Church.
