Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Sirach 3:17-18,20,28-29

Psalm 68(67);

Hebrews 12:18-19,2224a;

Luke 14:1,7-14

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ. Inspired by the beauty of a spring morning, Robert Browning wrote, "The lark's on the wing, the snail's on the thorn; God's in his heaven, all's right with the world". While the thought is beautiful, the poem suggests a misleading concept of God. "God's in his heaven, all's right with the world." How often we imagine God as "away up there, somewhere", while the world goes its separate way, with the events of every day independent of God. In contrast to this common idea of modern society, the liturgical readings of today show God in the person of Jesus Christ intervening in human affairs. Some people interpret the intervention of God in human affairs as a way to discipline us.

In the second reading, taken from the letter to the Hebrews, the term "discipline" does not mean punishment but the whole process of training, much like how a loving parent corrects and guides a child for their growth. The trials and hardships faced by the Christian community are projected as evidence of God's fatherly care. Endurance in such moments shows that we are His true children. Though discipline is painful now, over time it produces "a harvest of righteousness and peace" in those who are trained by it. The author was writing this letter at a time when the Hebrews were weary from persecution and tempted to give up. Therefore, the author reframes their suffering not as abandonment by God but as His loving preparation, shaping them to be more like Christ. This passage challenges our instinct to see hardship only as misfortune. God's discipline is not rejection but a sign of belonging. Like a skilled coach pushing an athlete beyond his comfort zone, God works through trials to build our spiritual endurance, integrity and peace. When we face struggles, be it illness, injustice or personal failure, it can be tempting to lose heart. But the author invites us to view these as part of God's training plan, not meaningless pain. If we submit to His guidance, our suffering can bear fruit, making us steadier, kinder and stronger in faith.

Imagine you are all excited about a new film that has just been released in the cinema. You meet up with your friends and go to the cinema and there you see the sign HOUSE FULL!. We hear about something similar in today's gospel reading, taken from Luke. As Jesus was travelling from town to town teaching, someone asked Him, "Lord, are only a few people going to be saved?" Jesus doesn't answer his question directly. What's important isn't knowing exactly how many will be saved. What's decisive is living with a clear and responsible attitude to welcome salvation from that good God. Jesus reminds them all: "Try your hardest to enter by the narrow door". In this way Jesus undercuts the reaction of those who understand His message as an invitation to laxity. Salvation isn't something one receives irresponsibly from a permissive God. It also isn't the privilege of an elect few. It isn't sufficient to have known the Messiah, to have heard and seen Him. One needs also to follow Him. The invitation to "enter by the narrow door" can be read in light of another saying of Jesus: "I am the door; the one who enters through me, will be saved" (John 10:9). Entering by the narrow door is "following Jesus", learning to live as He did. In following Him not everything counts, not everything is equal; we need to respond to the Father's love faithfully. What Jesus asks isn't legalistic religious rigorism, but a radical love for God and neighbour. That's why His call is a source of demand, but not of anxiety. Jesus Christ is a door that is always open. No one can close it, only we ourselves if we close ourselves to his forgiveness. It is personal and it is the daily choice to love God above all and to love our neighbour without excuse. The narrow door is open today. Tomorrow is not guaranteed. Step through it now before the sign reads, "House Full". May God bless us all.
