Next Sunday's Mass Readings

Wisdom 9:13-18

Psalm 90(89);

Philemon 9b-10,12-17

Luke 14:25-33

The focus of the Word of God this Sunday is humility. Positive psychology equates humility to modesty. What is humility or modesty? Although humility may falsely be equated with a sense of unworthiness and low self-regard, true humility is a rich, multifaceted state that entails an accurate assessment of one's characteristics, an ability to acknowledge limitations, and a "forgetting of the self". Modesty, which is related to humility, refers to the moderate estimation of one's merits or achievements.

The first reading taken from the Book of Sirach, also known as Ecclesiasticus, speaks clearly about the value of humility and the dangers of pride. The passage begins by encouraging us to do all tasks with meekness and humility, reminding us that such behaviour wins the love of those whom God accepts. Humility is presented as the true measure of greatness. It is not about putting ourselves down or feeling worthless, but about recognizing our true place before God and others. It's about honest self-awareness and knowing that everything we have comes from God. When we cultivate an attitude of humility, we open ourselves to seeing the goodness in others and in ourselves. We stop focusing on self-importance and instead become available to serve and listen, which is a sign of true wisdom. Some think being humble means we can't acknowledge the good we do. That's not true. We can be humble and acknowledge the good we do by giving credit where credit is due. This begins with acknowledging that the Lord is "the giver of every good gift". That is what we prayed in the opening prayer: "Lord, put into our hearts the love of your name, so that, by deepening our sense of reverence, you may nurture in us what is good and, by your watchful care, keep safe what you have nurtured". We are able to do good because of the gifts God has given us.

This awareness is the true wisdom that the Gospel poses to challenge within the context of a parable. In it Jesus wants his disciples to be counter-cultural, disregarding status-seeking and all ambition. They must stand out against prevailing social behaviours based on class, status, aggression and dominance. To follow Jesus, gentleness, compassion, acceptance of the other must be part of our way of life. In a society based on ambition, aggression, "going for it" regardless of consequences, being meek and humble can seem like a recipe for social disaster. But this is the point. What the Gospel presents is the direction which we must take to build a just society with room in it for all. Jesus wants his followers to live life to the full. "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." (John 10:10). This reminds me of a great Indian philosophical thought called "Nishkama Karma" (Selfless Action) which emphasizes action performed with a pure motive, free from personal desires, fears, or selfish ambitions. Its focus is on duty (Karma). The individual's right is to the action itself, not to its outcomes, promoting a sense of duty and offering actions to the divine or a greater good. Performing actions without attachment to their fruits helps to purify the mind and develop evenness of mind in both success and failure. By renouncing attachment to the results of one's work, an individual becomes more fit to experience reason and the benefits of renunciation itself. The humility of which Jesus speaks in the Gospel is the result of this 'Selfless Action'. Therefore, real humility is not weakness but a genuine self-awareness. They are essential if we are serious about changing our world to better reflect the will of God. We may be better off than others in many ways. That doesn't make us better than anyone else. The willingness to reach out to others is what makes us better, not by comparison to anyone else, but "better than ourselves", better than we might otherwise be, as persons, as Christians.
