THE JOURNEY OF GLOBAL AID NETWORK (GAIN)

In 2025, GAiN UK is celebrating ten years! Join them on a journey through the past decade as they share stories and highlights from their work. *Year 2025 Bulgaria*

Currently in Bulgaria, there are no social services for appropriate temporary accommodation and no functioning guardianship system for unaccompanied and separated children in Bulgaria. This has led to rampant abuse and neglect of children. There are also very few supports available for adults living in poverty leading to a large homeless population. With a growing need for services for separated children and homeless adults, St Sofia and St Dimitar were opened to give temporary shelter to those in need. There are currently over 125 children and over 450 adults living in these shelters. Both shelters are in desperate need of food, clothes, and shoes as the residents often arrive with very little and cannot move on without appropriate supplies. A truck carrying 24 pallets of aid left on 1st October for our partner in Sofia, and another shipment is planned for December.



Next Sunday's
Mass Readings
Exodus 17:8-13
Psalm 121(120);
2 Timothy 3:14-4:2
Luke 18:1-8

Welcome to everyone at Mass today, especially if you are new to our church or haven't been to Mass for some time. If you are of another Christian denomination or non-Christian you are warmly invited to approach the priest or minister and ask or signify your wish for a blessing.

On His way to Jerusalem, Jesus encounters 10 lepers who approached him from a distance and cry out, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us". Their cry is both desperate and full of faith. In biblical times, leprosy was not only a physical disease, but also a social and spiritual exile. Hence, they could not enter villages; they were kept at a distance, isolated and consigned to the margins of social and even religious life. By walking together, these lepers indicted a society that excluded them. We should also note that the Samaritan, although considered a heretic, "a foreigner" by the Jews, is part of their group. Whenever disease and fragility are shared, barriers fall and exclusion is overcome. Jesus does not heal them immediately. Instead, He gives them an instruction. Go and show yourselves to the priests. Lepers obey even though nothing has yet changed. Their healing takes place as they go on their way. This detail is deeply significant for us today. Faith often means walking forward before we see results. God's grace often unfolds gradually along the road of obedience and trust. These men believed in the word of Jesus and in that act of faith, they are healed. But the story does not end there; the nine lepers did what Jesus told them to do, but they missed a deeper moment of encounter. The Samaritan alone recognizes not only the gift, but also the giver. His gratitude brings him back to Jesus. And there he receives something more profound than physical healing. The difference between being healed and being saved lies in gratitude. All 10 were healed. But only one entered a relationship of love and faith with Jesus. His grateful attitude, then, is no mere act of courtesy, but the start of a journey of thanksgiving: he falls at Jesus' feet (Lk 17:16) and worships Him. He recognizes that Jesus is the Lord, that Jesus is more important than the healing he received. Gratitude in this sense is not just polite emotion, but a spiritual act, the foundation of faith itself. To live with gratitude is to live in constant awareness that everything we have is a gift from God. Our life, our talents, our families, even our struggles. Gratitude transforms a gift into communion. It changes a blessing into worship.

There is a further interesting aspect to the journey of the lepers: they move together. The Gospel tells us that, "as they went, they were made clean" (v. 14). The verbs are in the plural. Faith means also walking together, never alone. Once healed, however, nine of them go off on their own way, and only one turns back to offer thanks. Jesus then expresses His astonishment: "The others, where are they?" (v. 17). It is as if He asks the only one who returned to account for the other nine. It is the task of us, who celebrate the Eucharist as an act of thanksgiving, to take care of those who have stopped walking, those who have lost their way. We are called to be guardians of our distant brothers and sisters, all of us! We are to intercede for them; we are responsible for them, to account for them, to keep them close to heart of Jesus.

On this Jubilee year, we are given a model, indeed the model, to whom we can look: Mary, our Mother. After hearing the message of the Angel, she lifted up her heart in a song of praise and thanksgiving to God: "My soul magnifies the Lord..." Let us ask our Lady to help us recognize that everything is God's gift, and to be able to say, "Thank you". Then, I assure you, our joy will be complete. Only those who know how to say, "Thank you", will experience the fullness of joy.
